## Tis the Season?

Did you know that *Jingle Bells* actually has nothing to do with the Christmas season? (<mind blown>) It was originally written (1850) as a Thanksgiving song by a Unitarian Church music director in Medford (Mass.). It has more to do with drinking and conjuring up opportunities for young couples in love to sneak away for some "privacy." Check it out on Wikipedia...

Did you also know that *Joy to the World* has nothing to do with the Christmas season as well? It will always be found in hymnals in the Advent section, NOT in the Christmas section; and if you look closely you'll notice that it never mentions Jesus or his birth or any of the images/characters we expect to find in our Christmas carols. And the words, you'll see when you do look closely, are a more generic hymn of praise than related to a particular season.

Its theme, while definitely NOT referencing our Lord's first coming, which we celebrate at Christmas, is

actually about the Lord's second coming at the end of the age, and is based on Psalm 98.

And yet, *Joy to the World* has its place firmly in the Christmas Carol canon! (Though we don't know why.) And so, this year, we will sing it verse-by-verse as we light each of the four Advent candles every week in church; and I will preach on the theme of each verse each week as well.

I love this carol and am eager to go more deeply into what it means, and thereby discover how we can be encouraged and moved to a more joyful Advent season.



### **Church Council November 19 Meeting Summary**

The GPS (God's Purpose Seekers) gave an update; they will be meeting more often in December and will have an all-day planning retreat in January.

The 2014 budget is on track with expected income/expenses.

On Pledge Sunday, 65 pledges came in, which is similar to last year. We expect the remaining 40 pledges to come in over the next few weeks..

The Nominations Task Force has been formed with Rev. Gail, Erica Davenport, Kelli Hnath and Stefanie Lempp as members.

The Flower Ministry will not be filled next year, as their duties have been taken up by other groups/staff members.

The Congregational Meeting on November 23 will not be using Robert's Rules; feedback to Church Council members is encouraged.

The PPRC reports that Rev. Gail's review has taken place; a new review process may be used next year following a process outlined in the book, *Completing the Circle*, which the PPRC and Deacons area considering.

## Congregational Budget Meeting Summary Sunday, November 23



This was the first church meeting not using Robert's Rules. Comments are encouraged and should be directed to Rev. Gail, Moderator Stefanie Lempp or any Church Council member.

The budget presentation highlighted the outsourcing of payroll and hiring a clerk to assist with bookkeeping. Also, all committees will be informed how to access the contingency fund, if needed.

The Missions Committee made a report of their 2014 giving and expectations around their 2015 giving.

The final budget will be presented at the Annual Meeting on February 1.



In Sunday School a couple of weeks ago, our children studied the Parable of the Talents (Matthew 25:14-30). In this Scripture, Jesus tells of the master who entrusts three of his servants with different amounts of money ("talents") before he goes away. Two of the servants employ that with which they have been given to create a greater return, doubling the money. The third servant takes his talent and buries it in the ground. When the master returns, he showers praise on the two servants who employed the talents, and invites them to "enter into the joy of your master." The third servant receives scorn for not putting the talent he was given to use.

While "talents" in this parable refer to money, the word is the root of what we call talents today: those areas in which we have particular ability. Like all that we have, our talents are Godgiven. We are entrusted to not only use our talents, but to use them in God-pleasing ways.

We also must recognize that each person has been given different talents by God. In Romans 12:4-8, Paul uses the analogy of how a body's parts each have different functions, and so to we each "have gifts that differ according to the grace given to us." As with other gifts from God, we are entrusted to cultivate and employ these talents to serve God and his purposes in our world. Through prayer, study, and practice, we can discover the talents we have and strengthen them.

Think of the talents you may have. Do you have a gift for singing, ministering, sharing, numbercrunching, building, writing, caring, or teaching? Are you using those talents to serve God's kingdom? Do these gifts bring you joy, and bring joy to others? Are you using them in God-pleasing ways, to enter into the joy of God?

These are good questions to ponder as we approach the end of 2014 and prepare for the new year to come.





## 🕉 Christmas Angel Giving 2014

Christmas will soon be upon us and each of us can be an angel by contributing to our Christmas Angel Fund. During these trying economic times the needs are so great and we are fortunate to be part of such a generous church community. We strive to reach a balance among the supported organizations; having local, regional and global impacts, as well as organizations promoting Christianity beyond the bounds of our church. This year, four organizations have been selected to receive angel donations. You decide which ones receive your charitable donation, or you may let the Missions Committee decide for you.

**2015 Youth Mission Trip** Since 2010 our teenagers have connected to God and local communities through life-changing Christ-centered mission trips. (Youthworks and the Center for Student Missions are the mission agencies which have coordinated our work). We have served in Philadelphia, Washington D.C., Rutland VT, Hamlin WV, and Queens NY. Next summer (June 20-29) we will serve Pine Ridge Indian Reservation, South Dakota.

**Unbound (formerly Christian Foundation for Children—CFCA)** Unbound (formerly CFCA) would value your offering as a Christmas Angel this holiday season. This organization benefits the youth, as well as the elderly, with more than 94% of the donations directly supporting those families in need. The Missions Committee began sponsoring Carlos from El Salvador through CFCA in 2011. The Sunday School classes have been sending/receiving correspondence with Carlos over the past couple of years. This provides a first-hand experience around the generous gift of giving and how it has benefited Carlos and his family.

**Heifer International** Their mission is to end hunger/poverty and care for the earth.
