Do not be afraid. That's what the disciples were told on that very first Easter morning. For those of us, living so many years later, we know that there is a lot to fear. In the midst of this current pandemic it's easy to feel like the onslaught of painful and fearful things will never end. One of my favorite pastoral theologians, UCC minister Martin Copenhaver, writes:

As a pastor, I spend a portion of my time in close proximity to death. In such regions, shadowed by fear and loss, I so much want to reach for words that are reassuring. In the end, I don't have such words to offer, at least none of my own. I am not alone in this, of course.

Neither do the doctors. In the end, ultimately doctors do not have the authority to say, 'Do not be afraid.' Doctors do not know the future. They do not have the antidote to uncertainty. They cannot accompany a patient down every road. None of us can.

This is the reality of our lives right now, yet this is also the hope of Easter. Copenhaver says that whenever we find ourselves in these moments of fear, that's precisely when we need angels to arrive, in scripture and occasionally in our lives, to reassure us, 'Do not be afraid.' God often has this marvelous way of breaking into our lives, and into human history, often in ways that take us by surprise.

Copenhaver reminds us, "When the angel says, 'Do not be afraid,' or when Jesus says, 'Fear not,' it is NOT the assurance that nothing can go wrong, because often things do. It is NOT the assurance that everything will turn out for the best, because often it doesn't. Rather, it is the assurance that, whatever may happen to us, whatever the day may hold, God has the power to strengthen us and uphold us; that whatever we must face, we will not face it alone; that nothing we encounter is stronger than God's love; that ultimately God gets the last word in the end — and sometimes even before the end."

This is the message of Easter, and this is the hope that ushers in new life. While we will not be able to gather in person for shared worship on Easter Sunday, we can still find ways to celebrate the promise of resurrection in our lives. So, in the meantime, do not be afraid. God is with us in the midst of these liminal moments and is leading us through to the other side.

Church Council Meeting Summary — March 25

The meeting opened with Devotion (Rev. Corey Sanderson) - Lockdown (poem). We shared our thoughts about this poem and our current strange times and isolation imposed by the virus. We shared some of the joys we may have been able to find during these frightening times. We discussed purchasing a Zoom account for the church so that we could continue to gather with other church members in unique ways smaller Bible studies, virtual ladies' lunch, even virtual coffee hour?

There was an open discussion. Corey asked about ways in which we can reach out to those most in need during this time. Steve Legge said we need to give a lot of thought to who is living home alone, because those people might be having a really hard time emotionally. We discussed some people who might be most in need of contact and will make sure that those people get calls.

We spoke about office coverage and how we are trying to ensure Carol can work at home as much as possible. There will be a message stating that the office is closed but to leave a message and someone will respond.

Steve Legge asked about our current finances. Dennis said we are currently in a very good position. We have a number of people who donate online, which means most of that is still happening even without an offering. As long as at least some of the people who drop their pledges in the offering plate continue to mail in their checks occasionally, we will be fine until at least the end of July just with the money we have in the bank.

Our Accessibility Project: An Important Message from the Capital Campaign Team

Our Capital Campaign Team hopes you and your families are doing well during these trying times. The week of March 16, the team met (virtually) to discuss how to best proceed with the *Coming Together-Lifting Up-Reaching Out* campaign for the Accessibility Project. We came to the conclusion that, given the pandemic and the myriad of difficulties it is imposing on people everywhere, we should postpone the Capital Campaign for at least a few months. We have, formally, made the recommendation to the Church Council that we delay the campaign for a few months (maybe until September) to accommodate the potential changes our congregation may be facing in terms of employment, financial situations, and all the things that can occur in the aftermath of a pandemic.

We are deeply saddened to recommend taking this step back, even temporarily, as so many people are looking forward to completing the project. That being said, we do believe it is the best course of action at this time. We are very much looking forward to moving forward together as soon as is reasonably possible. But for the time being, it is necessary to "press the pause button."

Our Campaign Kickoff Event on March 8 was so well received and fun with nearly 100 people of all ages in attendance. We are thankful to all those who participated and to all who lent us a hand to make the event run so smoothly. We were thrilled to see so many attendees dressed in 1820s and 1920s costume!
