Do you ever have a hard time when someone tells you 'No' to something you really want to do? If you're at all like me, the answer is 'Yes.' If there is one thing that tends to frustrate us to no end, it's being told we cannot do something. I've become acutely aware of that feeling lingering in the background of my life during these last two months.

As Americans, we pride ourselves on being individuals. We cherish our autonomy, we celebrate our freedom to choose, and we love having agency. Anything that seeks to constrain, diminish, disrupt, or challenge these cherished viewpoints or values comes across as 'bad' at best or 'threatening' at worst.

Years ago, when I was teaching at a college, I assigned my Ethics students a challenging project for their final exam. Each student had to develop their own personal ethical code for the rest of their life. They had to present it, explain it, and then defend it according to what we learned in class. [Count yourselves lucky I'm just your minister!] Our semester would begin with the simplest kinds of ethical reasoning, theories that are mostly relativistic and egoistic in nature. Here, people decide on a course of action based solely on their feelings or on their own personal gain. They do whatever feels good and rush to call that the 'right' thing. By the end of the semester, my students were thinking deeply about obligations to their neighbors, the role of community, enacting the virtues of justice, and the duties citizens have in supporting and working for The Common Good. The design of the course was intentional. I wanted it to mimic the general growth of ethical reasoning that we all go through in some way or another in life.

While restaurants and barbershops are taking their first steps at opening *safely*, I believe churches are being called to open *faithfully*. Rather than simply copying or reacting to what other groups are doing, faithful churches should be modelling responsible decisions while also making sure they exceed the basic health guidelines in order to ensure the safety of all. Churches that open faithfully will make sure that whatever they do, it reflects the values and nature of the God who creates us and loves us and the Church that God has called into existence. To open faithfully, churches will need to take some time to thoughtfully reflect on their values.

One value that I keep returning to is how we, as a Church, **honor and care for the vulnerable**. What would it say about us as a church if we excluded the vulnerable of our congregation as we rushed to re-open? "Sorry, Mom, but you have to stay home from church this morning because you're over 70." [Can you hear Jesus whispering something about the first being last and the last being first?]. Christ calls us to be the Church *together*. That's the gift of being the church. While the surrounding culture often dismisses the vulnerable, usually those in their golden years, that's not what we do in the Church.

I keep thinking of that beloved passage in scripture where St. Paul teaches about the unity and diversity of the Body of Christ. Paul says, "Just as a body, though one, has many parts, but all its many parts form one body, so it is with Christ. For we were all baptized by one Spirit so as to form one body—whether Jews or Gentiles, enslaved or free—and we were all given the one Spirit to drink. Even so the body is not made up of one part but of many" (1 Corinthians 12).

As our church leaders discern the next best steps for our church family, we are seeking to do things in God's time, which is not always our time. While we have no idea what the future will bring, we know that we follow a God of hope and resurrection who knows all about making all things new (Isaiah 43:18). This is where our faith lies and where our values are grounded. Remember, friends, the church has never closed. The church remains open, even though we aren't physically gathering in our building. In the days ahead, let us remember to follow Christ's call to love our neighbors just as we love ourselves (Mark 12:31).
