

I've been told that, somewhere deep in the archives of Harvard University, is a small pamphlet that chronicles the earliest years of the Plymouth colony in Massachusetts. The original Puritan settlement was called, 'New England's First Fruits.' The surviving 26-page pamphlet, which was published in 1643, summarizes the values the early Puritan community held and it outlines the goals this new settlement community would be striving for. Today, we might recognize this as their Vision, Mission, and Values statements.

One of the most important values the Puritans held was learning. In the ancient Greek manuscripts of our Bible, the original language of the New Testament, the word used for 'disciple' is *mathétés* (pr. 'math-aytes'). While *mathétés* does mean 'disciple,' it equally means 'learner.' This is why Jesus says, 'Take my yoke upon you and *learn from me*, for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls' (Mt. 11:29).

The early Puritans understood the need for constant learning and education. Here's a slightly paraphrased version of what the pamphlet said.

"After God had carried us safe to New England, and we had built our houses, provided the necessities of our livelihood, reared convenient places for God's worship, and settled the civil government, one of the next things we longed for and looked after was to advance learning and to perpetuate our posterity, dreading to leave an illiterate ministry to our churches when our present ministers shall lie in the dust."

Our Congregational heirs were pretty brilliant and aware. It's a powerful realization, isn't it? When the current crop of ministers is buried in the ground, the fear was that the churches would lose their highly educated leaders. Right from the start, these dour, uptight, and overly serious Puritans had a bold vision for what was needed if this new community settlement were going to survive and thrive in the future. These were the five values, priorities, and aims to which they held dearly. These values would become the foundation to this brand-new society:

- 1. The Home: You not only need a solid house, but solid family relationships.
- 2. **The Necessities of Life:** You need a productive way of making a livelihood.
- 3. A Place to Worship God: You need faith and a faithful community.
- 4. The Role of Civil Order: You need social organization expressed through government.
- 5. The Need for Education and Learning: You need literate, wise, and learned people.

Learning and education was an *essential* element for this new society. As you may know, the vision of the Puritans is still with us today. They started educational institutions, such as Harvard College, which is now Harvard University. Many of the nation's top colleges and universities began as religious schools to raise up an educated clergy *in order to help churches be educated*. Still today, we have Princeton, Columbia, Rutgers, Brown, Dartmouth, University of Pennsylvania, William and Mary, and more.

As we move out of this pandemic, we all have a lot of learning to do. Our world is radically different. As a church, we will have to adjust and change, pivot and refine, pick up new things and let go of old things. We simply need to ensure that our church is relevant to our post-pandemic world, rather than a model of how things used to be.

We always need to see ourselves as learners because our teacher is Jesus. We should be able to learn from everybody and anyone, but most of all, we should be engaged in learning that focuses on the One who we learn the most from. The journey of faith is not learning 'about' Jesus, but 'learning from Jesus' or 'learning Jesus.'

How To Be In The Present. Five Sundays January 23*, 30*, February 6*, 13*, 20

The Christ Child has been born. The Magi from the East have arrived with their unusual gifts. What will this mean in our lives? Will we even notice? The strange paradox of life is that our very best future depends on how we live in the present. For most of us, we have some work to do. Maybe we are ruminating about the past or worrying about the future. Author, Annie Dillard, says, "How we spend our days is, of course, how we spend our lives." Most of us aren't truly present. We are distracted. We aren't paying attention. We're too busy. This five-week sermon series will help us become more fully present to God, to others around us, and even to ourselves.
